Campaign to END Pediatric HIV/AIDS (CEPA)

1. CEPA is being launched as a network of civil society organizations at the national, regional, and global levels. The common goal of the network is mobilize the political will and financial resources needed to overcome bottlenecks to scaling up pediatric HIV diagnosis, treatment, and care programs, initially in six African nations.
2. CEPA partners will engage in advocacy to increase coverage rates for prevention of mother-to-child transmission and pediatric treatment services from the current average of 30% to 40% to the globally agreed-upon target of 80%
3. Funding for CEPA is provided through the Global AIDS Alliance, an independent civil society organization based in Washington, DC, which seeks to mobilize a comprehensive and compassionate response to the global AIDS crisis, while addressing the epidemic's fundamental links to social justice issues such as poverty and gender inequity. GAA receives no funding from either government sources or the pharmaceutical industry.
4. CEPA is a three-year campaign, initially with six focus countries: Uganda, Kenya, Tanzania, Mozambique, Zambia and Nigeria, with initiating partners at the global, regional, and country levels. Over time, other countries in Africa and in other regions of the world will join CEPA.
